# A short declaration Eden on fire: there is hope in Amazonia

To the entire planetary community, from Manaus, the heart of the Amazon forest, an outcry! But also a cry of hope!

Although it is renowned for its socio-biodiversity, unfortunately when the Amazon makes the nightly news in Brazil and worldwide, it is with images of the forest suffering devastating attacks. Sadly, São Paulo and other major cities in Brazil only recently started paying attention to the forest, and that was when clouds of ashes from centuries-old trees and animals of extraordinary beauty darkened the sky, and the rains washed the asphalt and concrete with soot. The rainy season has come to extinguish the forest fires for a while, but there is still a lot of smoke.

Even more than the fires or the advance of agribusiness and mining in Amazonia, the crisis that the pandemic has brought us makes the consequences of the socio-economic problems of under-development that are part of daily life, and that affect those who are most severely poor, more evident than ever.

Someone said to me, 'Unfortunately, when the time has come ...', but this is absurd. The time had not come for any of the more than 200,000 Brazilian lives lost due to the irresponsibility of our leaders, the denial of science and the genocidal mediocrity of chloroquine and Ivermectin. Most people in Amazonia do not have a permanent job or

the possibility to work remotely from home; they live in informality, always invisible in their day-to-day lives, but today they are on the front pages of newspapers. The government has cut financial aid to people, making them even more socially and physically vulnerable. They did not succumb to Covid; they were murdered by the irresponsible policy of vaccine wars, misinformation, selfishness, denial and perversity. Were it different, many would possibly be here today with their usual smiles. On the day that Manaus feels one of the worst blows of the pandemic, the President of the Republic affirms that he will guarantee the right of those who do not want to be vaccinated. Now a new more transmissible strain of the virus is circulating in Manaus.

Manaus is the largest and main city in the Brazilian Amazon. Half the population of the state of Amazonas, which is more than 4 million people live there, and it has had a 25 % increase in its population over the last decade. Big city, bigger problems, more poverty. But what is the true reality of what is currently happening in the best known postcard of the rainforest?

The collapse of the health and funeral systems that was experienced in Manaus during 2020 is being repeated. This time the scenario is even worse, because there is not enough oxygen to supply all the hospitals. ICUs have turned into suffocation chambers. Before the pandemic, Manaus had approximately nine ICU beds and 27 respirators for every 100,000 inhabitants, which shows the great precariousness of the health system even without having to deal with a pandemic. In addition, the capital is the only city in the state with infrastructure for patients with Covid. But now some patients are being transferred to other states in complex logistical operations and at high financial costs. All of this could have been avoided had there not been widespread denial, neglect, corruption and administrative malfeasance.

Today there is not enough oxygen, but we will continue to fight until our last breath! Fight to save the remaining air! How can we talk about and want to advance sustainable development in the Amazon rainforest, if practically all rivers in the urban area of Manaus are polluted? If the capital's landfill has reached its limit, and no alternatives are put in place, although there is a plan to open another hole in the forest and continue the contamination of streams with polluted run-off? Even now there are people who blame the inaccessibility of Manaus as an excuse not to build more roads to the Amazon, but 150 years ago it was considered the Paris of the tropics, so what's changed? Ain't there the opposition to indigenous land demarcation and the dismantling of government agencies that inspect and control deforestation as forms of avowed environmental racism of our leaders? There is a lack of consistency between words and actions. The Amazon is still a colony, a heavy burden that can no longer be carried. The defense of the socio-biodiversity of Amazonia, a heritage of humanity, our piece of Pachamama, can only be maintained if there is social justice. This includes looking after our common home and those who live with us. Only then can the lungs of the world continue to breathe and our heart to beat!

There is other local news that does not reach everyone that can raise our collective hopes: numerous solidarity actions are underway in Manaus, and in the Amazon as a whole, and have been since the beginning of the pandemic. Expeditions by fearless

warriors who take food, medicine, masks and hygiene kits to those in need. There are also actions that support the solidarity economy and food security and sovereignty in the capital and in the interior. Today we see dynamic and spontaneous cooperation by residents to share information about any stocks of oxygen tanks taking place via networks and social media. This prevents these channels from becoming overloaded with news about deaths and acts to effectively save lives!

May these words be a call to build a broad humanitarian front for Manaus and the Amazon. Yes, there are many people here who truly care for and protect the forest and its people, but it is necessary to disclose what is really happening, create social pressure and thereby promote the necessary changes effectively.
